1) Executive Summary

 This is Luton Borough Council's first Strategy designed specifically to address the housing needs of Black and Ethnic Minority Communities in Luton. The Strategy outlines the initiatives being undertaken by the Councils Housing Services in conjunction with our Housing Partners and users.

Scope of the Strategy and Main Objectives

- The term Black & Minority Ethnic in this document is used to refer to people from ethnic and/or racial backgrounds, who may also have a disability. This includes people from Irish, Gypsies and Traveller communities.
- 3. The BME Strategy will be an integral part of the Councils overall strategic vision and will support the overarching housing strategy as well as the Councils wider vision contained in the Sustainable Communities Strategy and Corporate Strategy, which have 4 main themes.
 - Stronger and Safer Communities
 - Health and Well being
 - Environment and economic development
 - Children and Young People
- 4. Addressing housing need is key to achieving improvements in the these areas and the development of this strategy has been informed by them.
- 5. Luton's overarching Housing Strategy has 5 local strategic priorities;
 - Enabling Growth
 - Increasing Delivery of Affordable Housing
 - Reduce levels of homelessness throughout the town
 - Tackle poor conditions in the Private Rented stock
 - Ensuring Council Owned Stock is maintained to a high standard.
- 6. The BME Strategy has three objectives;
 - Ensure that the specific housing needs of Black and Minority Ethnic people living in Luton are identified;
 - Ensure that the Housing and Homelessness Strategies meet the needs of BME communities;

 Work towards an environment where people from diverse communities can live together in harmony.

Context

National BME Housing Issues

- 7. In many areas housing issues and social exclusion are particularly evident in BME Communities. Homelessness has long been held to be a measure of social exclusion and BME households are consistently overrepresented in homelessness figure on a national level.
- 8. Latest DCLG figures show that BME households account for 25% of national homelessness acceptances; this is more than twice the total BME population recorded at the last Census and is a significant overrepresentation.
- 9. Nationally speaking housing, overcrowding and the number living in unsuitable housing is greater, and resident satisfaction lower amongst BME communities although with significant variations amongst communities.

Local BME Housing Issues

- 10. Luton has a large and diverse BME population, which according to the 2001 census comprises some 35% of the towns population, against a national average of just 13.5%.
- 11.BME communities have historically faced housing problems in Luton, over 40% of the total number of households accepted by the Council as homeless in 2007/8 were from BME communities.
- 12. Access to suitable housing is much lower amongst BME communities; a recent study conducted by Opinion Research Services on behalf on the Council found that 40% of the Pakistani and Bangladeshi Communities lived in unsuitable housing against an average of only 24%.
- 13. In 2005 the Council commissioned ORS to undertake a survey of the Housing Needs of BME communities. The survey suggests that Luton has a higher BME population than the 2001 census suggests.
- 14. The key findings of the survey include;
 - BME communities, especially Pakistani and Bangladeshi communities were under-represented in the last census.

- There has been a net out-migration of the White British population
- BME households are more likely to contain children
- Pakistani and Bangladeshi communities are far more likely to be in unsuitable housing.
- 15. There is increasing demand being placed on the homelessness service in Luton and hostel accommodation is at capacity.
- 16. BME communities are still overrepresented amongst homeless housholds.
- 17. Tenant satisfaction amongst BME communities is rising but is still below the satisfaction for White British tenants.

Action Plan

18. A preliminary draft action plan is attached to this strategy that outlines the planned actions that have already been identified to address each of the themes identified above. The Forum is invited to comment and add additional tasks.
