Please provide an outline description of your proposal:

Luton Borough Council currently owns 922 sheltered homes provided in 20 Sheltered Schemes and 2 Extra Care Schemes across the town. Sheltered Housing enables tenants to live independently, having the freedom and privacy of their own front door with the added security of knowing that there is help at hand. Sheltered Schemes are promoted on the basis that they provide residents with access to a scheme manager, a 24hr emergency alarm system, home care to meet personal needs, communal activities and social spaces.

Currently there are a number of problems with the service that need to be resolved, which include:

- Service levels are inconsistent between schemes, reflecting varying staffing arrangements, staff to tenant ratios and levels of onsite service.
- Resources for housing related support are not targeted where they are most needed and there is limited capacity to deliver outreach work into the wider community.
- The current staffing model does not provide flexibility to ensure cover is provided when and where it is needed.

Historically the staffing model operated by the Council has involved residential scheme managers, on a one manager per site basis. Pending the outcome of previous sheltered housing reviews, five vacancies have been left unfilled and four posts have been filled on a non-residential temporary basis.

Whilst some of the shortcomings of the current service could theoretically be tackled by increasing staffing to a level of more than one manager per scheme, this would represent a significant growth in costs that would have to be meet from tenants rents or service charges. Moreover, it would not solve some of the broader contextual challenges and those raised by earlier sheltered reviews:

- 1. An oversupply of sheltered housing resulting in problems of low demand.
- 2. An increasingly complex profile of needs within schemes more residents with complex needs and an increasingly ageing population, living alongside independent retirees who don't yet need support

but want the communal environment which schemes provide.

- 3. Physical problems with the stock e.g. 3 schemes without lifts, 5 with bedsit accommodation, a number which are not fully wheelchair accessible.
- 4. A growing need likely to emerge for housing related support amongst older residents in the wider community.
- 5. The pressure to make better use of available resources. Funding for housing related support comes from the Council's General Fund and this funding stream must deliver value for money, with resources targeted at those who need it.

In seeking to address these broader contextual challenges, the Council is asked to consider four proposals to improve and develop the service so that it meets the needs of current and potential future service users.

<u>These are in all cases proposals to consult on, rather than implement change.</u> The four proposals put forward by initial consideration are:

- 1. **To consult with tenants, staff and other key stakeholders** about improving and developing the service through a new model of support, namely:
  - A neighbourhood cluster model with one sheltered scheme providing an office base that serves a cluster of neighbouring sheltered schemes and people living in the wider community. This model would provide a mix of on-site and mobile/off-site scheme management, with scope to develop a more comprehensive 24/7 emergency response service than that currently provided.
- 2. To develop more detail staffing and service proposals through consultation with staff, Union and tenant representatives, which should include developing a vision for the service, identifying required staffing levels and agreeing how any transition away from a residential model of scheme could be managed.
- 3. To identify schemes that could become office base sites within neighbourhood clusters through analysis of need within these schemes (e.g. tenant age profile, proportion of tenants in high need groups or in receipt of domiciliary care, percentage of tenants in daily contact with their scheme manager) and use this information in the service planning and consultation process as appropriate.
- 4. Review whether there is potential for re-designation, following a full and detailed consultation process with scheme residents, staff and other relevant stakeholders, and develop investment proposals to address the need for upgrading in some schemes.

If some or all of these proposals were to be considered viable for consultation with tenants, staff and stakeholders then they would be taken to Executive accordingly to request for permission to consult.

The Neighbourhood Cluster Model has been proposed for potential consultation with stakeholders

because it provides the optimum way of improving the quality and consistency of service, whilst offering continued onsite provision within office-base schemes, alongside a mobile offsite service for satellite schemes.

As well as consulting on the principle of the Neighbourhood Cluster Model, the Sheltered Housing Review Group is being asked to recommend that permission is sought to consult on the detailed elements of any potential change. It is recognised that it is through involving staff and service users in discussions about the detail of a possible new model that the optimum outcome is likely to be delivered, in the form of improved service delivery.

Consultation on potential change is integral to ensuring that we deliver the best outcomes for Sheltered Housing Tenants in the future. Given the vulnerable nature of many residents and the sensitivity of the subject matter, care and caution will be taken in all communication with residents. It is hoped that tenants' experience of engaging in consultation with the aim of better service delivery would be a positive experience for them.

This draft IIA is therefore part of a report to Executive on 3<sup>rd</sup> December, asking for permission to consult with tenants, stakeholders and staff on the areas outlined above. This draft IIA assesses the likely impact (in principle) of the implementation of Proposal 1 above – i.e. the introduction of a neighbourhood cluster model – on protected groups within the base of affected service users.

This draft IIA concludes that, as the proposals stand at this time, the broad impact of a change of service model on service users overall may be positive, as the overall aims of the consultation on remodelling the service are to improve the quality and consistency of the Council's sheltered housing service, by working to deliver:

- Homes that people want to live in, and that will be fit for purpose as they age
- More choice for service users about the intensity of housing management service and the support they receive
- An equitable use of Council resources to support older people living in sheltered housing and in the wider community

As the proposals are at an early stage, this IIA treats the Sheltered Scheme tenants as one affected group, analysing the impact of the change on protected groups within the sheltered scheme population as a whole.

Should permission to consult on any or all of the other proposals be granted and a more detailed service and staffing proposal be developed, further work would be carried out on this IIA. This would include an assessment of the impact of change for specific groups within the overall Sheltered Accommodation, to reflect the changes that are being made. As an example, based on the recommendations above, this analysis would address:

- 1. The impact of the proposed change on **service users within sites which are designated to become 'office base sites'** within the neighbourhood cluster scheme i.e. those with an onsite presence
- 2. The impact of the proposed change on service users within sites which are designated to

**become 'satellites'** within the neighbourhood cluster scheme – i.e. those without a permanent onsite presence

- 3. The impact of the proposed change on **service users within sites which are potential sites for re-designation.**
- 4. The impact of the proposed change on **staff**, once further detail on staffing arrangements has been developed through consultation.

Initial consultation with tenants has been conducted in 2012 the form of the Sheltered Housing Survey. This survey was conducted to explore residents' perceptions of the service, and to develop a better understanding of customer requirements. A very good response rate was received, with 443 responses, representing a 49% response rate. A brief report of findings is attached with this draft IIA. This evidence suggests that while scheme managers' services are highly valued by the majority of residents, some residents do not feel their needs are being effectively met, and satisfaction levels vary from scheme to scheme. This early feedback highlights the need to review the current approach to service delivery to provide a more consistent level of service across the borough.

The information accompanying the Sheltered Housing Survey explained that the sheltered housing review was exploring a range of ways to deliver service improvements, including through alternative staffing and service models. This information prompted some letters of concern from relatives of residents living in Quantock Court, and petitions from Quantock and Memorial Court raising concerns about moving away from the current residential scheme manager model of provision; respondents were very anxious about the impact of any staffing changes on their security and safety. If the Council agrees to consult residents about changing its service model, it will be essential to explain how the changes will deliver improvements in the quality and consistency of service, and to show that residents' security will not be negatively affected. As part of the consultation process, residents and their families will need to be provided with the opportunity to meet officers for face to face discussion about what is proposed, and to have access to independent advice/advocacy.

A staff focus group was conducted in 2012, to enable staff to contribute to the development of the framework for the sheltered housing review. A write up of the findings is attached with this IIA.

This IIA accompanies a report which requests permission to consult on the proposal to re-model the service on the basis of a Neighbourhood Cluster framework. If granted permission to consult we would undertake this consultation with tenants, staff and stakeholders to collate views on a potential new model and to develop ideas for the operational elements for any new model of service. The feedback from this consultation would be returned to Council Executive in order to make a decision on the future of the service.





**Gender:** Positive. If the proposal to introduce a Neighbourhood Cluster model of service was implemented after consultation with tenants, staff and stakeholders then this change would have a disproportionate impact on females, as women represent 56% of the Sheltered Housing population compared to 48% of the Luton population at large. Subject to further consultation, the overall impact on this protected group is expected to be positive, as the overall change to the service is designed to improve quality, make the service more equitable and consistent, and target resources more effectively to those who need it. As women are disproportionately affected by changes to sheltered housing, changes that improve the quality and consistency of service and the built environment will impact particularly on the female residents of sheltered housing.



Gender Mix: Luton population vs. Sheltered Housing Tenants

**Disability:** Positive. If the proposal to introduce a Neighbourhood Cluster model of service was implemented after consultation with tenants, staff and stakeholders then this change would have a disproportionate impact on those with a disability, as this group represent 26% of the Sheltered Housing population (those classified as having a specialist need in terms of mobility, frailty or nursing care), compared to 15% of the Luton population at large. Subject to consultation, the impact on this protected group is expected to be positive for those with a disability, as the overall change to the service is designed both to improve the consistency and quality of the service, and to target resources for housing related support at those who need it. Improvements to the built environment will also have a beneficial impact. The proposed changes to the service would also potentially improve access to help and support for those living



Age: Positive. If the proposal to introduce a Neighbourhood Cluster model of service was implemented after consultation with tenants, staff and stakeholders then this change would have a disproportionate impact on those over the age of 65, as this group represent 78% of the Sheltered Housing population to 11% of the Luton population at large. Subject to consultation, the impact on this protected group is expected to be positive for older residents, as the overall change to the service is designed both to improve the consistency and quality of the service, and to target resources for housing related support at those who need it. Improvements to the built environment in schemes that need upgrading will also have a beneficial impact. The proposed changes to the service would also potentially improve access to help and support to older people living in the wider community.




