Recommendations

1. The Children's Services Review Group (CSRG) support the proposals and request the Executive seriously considers where outside providers take over from council run services that sufficient support is in place prior to implementation.

Background

- 2. At the meeting of the Children's Services Review Group held on 21 January 2021, the Service Director Quality and Improvement, submitted a report on Integrated Family Partnership Service Proposals and Delivery of Universal Services.
- 3. The CSRG received an update on progress on proposals to develop an integrated service combining existing services such as; the flying start children's centres, early help services and supervised contact services at the Manor Road contact centre. The committee was also provided with an outlined on alternative potential delivery models for universal services.
- 4. The new integrated family partnership services is based on principles of reprioritising services to support the most vulnerable children, young people and families in Luton. The proposals intend to achieve efficiencies in the departments overall savings target to ensure Luton's services support the most vulnerable by aligning with the principles of the development of the corporate Target Operating Model to strengthen statutory services and increase targeted intervention for the most vulnerable children and their families.

The Current Position

5. At the Emergency Budget Council meeting in July last year a number of proposals put forward included a £1.5m savings to be made from integrating services, merging management structures, ceasing delivery of a range of universal targeted services and closing a number of children's centres.



- 6. The remaining resources to be targeted at supporting the most vulnerable families delivered from two main delivery hubs (Leagrave and Manor Contact Centre) with a satellite delivery sites (London Road Resource Centre and Beech Hill Children's Centre).
- 7. The CSRG fully support the proposals within the report and resolve the following:
 - (i) That the Executive seriously considers where outside providers take over from council run services that sufficient support is in place prior to implementation.
- **8.** The committee unanimously supported the above resolution.
