- Executive is recommended to agree the attached Section 75 and 76 Agreement with NHS Luton / Luton Clinical Commissioning Group (LCCG) covering a range of services for adults and older people.
- 2. Executive is recommended to delegate authority to the Corporate Director, Housing and Community Living to i) agree final sign off of this agreement in terms of wording (which is still being checked by solicitors) and budget (which is based on spend at 31/12/2012 and could vary slightly); ii) negotiate further services for adults and older people that could be better managed through a Pooled Budget arrangement, with the aim of incorporating these into Schedule 4 of the Partnership Agreement during its period of operation 1<sup>st</sup> April 2013 -31<sup>st</sup> March 2016.

### Background

- 3. Section 75 and 76 of the National Health Act 2006 provided a legal framework in respect of Health Care Flexibilities that enable partnership arrangements by the introduction of innovative, cross-sectoral working through pooled budgets, lead commissioning and integrated provision. (S75 enables the NHS to transfer money to a local authority and to pool budgets, whereas S76 allows the local authority to transfer money to the NHS).
- 4. Section 75 and 76 Agreements provide legal and financial frameworks for integrated commissioning and service delivery including the establishment of pooled budgets. They also enable officers of the lead organisation (in this case Luton Borough Council) to be legally accountable for the commissioning of services on behalf of the other organisation, currently NHS Luton, but from 1st April Luton Clinical Commissioning Group.

#### The current position

5. A Section 75 Agreement has been in place for many years between Luton PCT and Luton Borough Council, but PCTs will be abolished from 1<sup>st</sup> April 2013 and the current agreement expires on 31<sup>st</sup> March. A new agreement has now been drawn up between the Council and NHS Luton on behalf of Luton CCG, which will assume responsibility for the majority of commissioning functions from the PCT on 1<sup>st</sup> April 2013. The new agreement covers the same services as the previous agreement.

# Goals and Objectives

6. The continuation and further development of partnership, pooled budgets and lead commissioning arrangements should ensure a more integrated service for service users and

enable more effective commissioning activity across the partners to the agreement.

### Proposal

- 7. The current and new S75 and S76 agreement covers the following services:
  - the Joint Commissioning Post for Adults;
  - the Joint Equipment Service (which covers adults and children);
  - the integrated Community Learning Disability Team for adults and care purchasing budgets including lead commissioning of an NHS budget.
- 8. It is likely that once Luton CCG is fully operational that there will be further opportunities to progress integrated working through pooled budgets and lead commissioning arrangements. The current agreement has been drafted in such a way as to enable additional schedules to be added to the agreement.
- 9. The Financial Schedule for 2013/14 (based on spend at 31/12/2012) is as follows:

## Key Risks

- 10. The key risks with all pooled budget agreements are that the total fund will be inadequate to meet the need and that further provision will then need to be made. This would also be true, however, if no such agreement was in place and the Agreement does make provision for regular monitoring of activity and spending through the Future Joint Strategic Commissioning Group. The proposed S75 and S76 Agreement makes it clear that no overspend of the CCG's contribution is permitted without prior agreement by the CCG, and that if any such overspend is projected the Head of Adult Joint Commissioning should prepare a plan to manage the overspend and achieve financial balance. Such Agreements, therefore, do provide greater protection for both organisations delivering or commissioning integrated services than no agreement at all, and also remove the need for funding negotiations on each specific case.
- 11. The Agreement is currently being reviewed by the Council's Legal Department, and NHS Luton's solicitors either of whom may propose minor amendments.

### Consultations

12. Consultation has taken place with Luton CCG. Managers involved in the services together with Adult Services Finance officer have been consulted on the draft agreement.

a)	Approve the Section 75 Agreement. This would enable the establishment or continued commissioning and delivery of integrated services within a properly constituted legal and financial framework.
b)	Decline to approve the agreements. This would discontinue or prevent the establishment of pooled budget and joint working arrangements with potential disruption to some services whilst new arrangements are agreed.
