## **PURPOSE**

The purpose of this report is to enable the Licensing Panel to consider the 1. application received from Trading Standards for the review of the Premises Licence in respect of Luton International Supermarket, 9 Wellington Street Luton LU1 2QH

## **RECOMMENDATION**

WARDS AFFECTED: SOUTH

2. That the Licensing Panel determine the application from Trading Standards for the review of a Premises Licence in respect of Luton International Supermarket, 9 Wellington Street Luton.

## **BACKGROUND**

3. The Applicant states that they are a responsible authority. The application for review of the premises licence was received on 11<sup>th</sup> November 2016 with regard to Luton International Supermarket.

A review application has been submitted previously for Luton International Supermarket by Trading Standards in April 2014 for illicit tobacco and evaded duty.

The current licence allows supply of alcohol for consumption off the premises to take place. A copy of the licence is attached at Appendix A. (pgs 11-18)

4. The application for review relates to the following licensing objectives:

The prevention of crime and disorder & Public safety;

A copy of the review application is attached at Appendix B. (pgs 19-25)

- 5. Information to support the application is as follows:
- 6. Supporting documents were attached with the application. They consist of:
  - A witness statement from Trading Standard Enforcement Officers that attended the premises when the tobacco products were seized on a visit on 11.02.2016
  - ii. Records and logs of articles seized along with photographs of the tobacco products stored in a microwave.
  - iii. A witness statement from a Brand Enforcement Officer who confirmed the Golden Virginia hand rolled tobacco was counterfeit.
  - iv. A witness statement from a Technical officer who is responsible for testing of consumer products, who stated the sample would pose a risk of a fire by not self-extinguishing as required by the applicable standard.
  - v. Testing sheets for the applicable methodology.
  - vi. Witness statement from September 2013 when illicit tobacco was previously found at the premises.

A copy of the supporting information is attached at Appendix C. (pgs 26-65)

- 7. The applicant has made an application for review relating to this premise before. The Licensing Service received an application for that review on 1<sup>st</sup> April 2014. This followed the earlier discovery of counterfeit tobacco on the premises. That application was heard by a Panel on 16 May 2014 after the premises licence holder and director had pleaded guilty to offences relating to its possession. At that time the Panel suspended the licence for a period of 28 days. A copy of the earlier report and minutes of the Panel hearing are attached as Appendix D. (pgs 66-96)
- 8. Since the application for review was received the Council has received an application to transfer the licence to a new holder, namely a company which is believed to be owned by same family as the previous holder. Unless the Council receives a representation from the police based on prevention of the Crime and Disorder objective within 14 days of the application the Council must transfer the licence. This does not however, prevent the application for a review being heard by a Panel, nor limit the options available to the Panel. Copies of the application for transfer and the notice of transfer are attached as Appendix E. (pgs 97-104)



  - a. Any refusal of the sale of alcohol
  - b. Any complaints received from the public
  - c. Any incidents of disorder
  - d. Any faults In the CCTV system
  - e. All crimes reported by the premises
  - f. Any visit by a relevant authority or emergency service.
- 2. A sign must be displayed asking customer to leave quietly.
- 3. A CCTV system which is fit for purpose with recording facilities will be in place at site and maintained in good working order. The system will produce images of evidential quality in all light conditions and will have constant, accurate time and date generation. Images will be kept for 31 days and will be made available to the police upon reasonable request.
  - a. There will be a colour camera covering the entrance/exit door which will be capable of providing a good quality head and shoulder image of persons leaving the premises.

## Please state the ground(s) for review:

On 11<sup>th</sup> February 2016 an inspection visit was carried out at the business of Devran Food Limited trading as Luton International Supermarket, 9 Wellington Street, Luton, LU1 2QH.

Tobacco products that were non-compliant with the Tobacco Products (Manufacture, Presentation and Sale) (Safety) Regulations 2002 were seized.

These products did not have a required prescribed health warning in English and also a required prescribed picture warning on them.

#### Seized items:

- 1.5 kg of Golden Virginia hand rolling tobacco, found at rear of the shop.
- 33 Packets of 20 foreign labelled cigarettes, found in a Microwave by the checkout.

## (Witness Statement of Michael Alan Smith refers: Appendix A)

The Golden Virginia was examined by the Trade Mark owners brand enforcement officer and it is deemed to be Counterfeit,

## (Witness Statement of Stephen Horsey refers: Appendix B)

A brand known as Bond Street was tested for Reduced Ignition Propensity and it failed.

Reduced Ignition Propensity for cigarettes is a safety issue and constitutes an offence under the General Product Safety Regulations 2005.

## (Witness Statement of Stephen John Littlewood and Report number LT909 refers: Appendix C)

On 23<sup>rd</sup> February 2016 a further inspection visit was carried out and tobacco product was seized for being non-compliant with the Tobacco Products (Manufacture, Presentation and Sale) (Safety) Regulations 2002.

Seized items:

43 packets of 20 cigarettes.

A brand known as Bond Street was tested for Reduced Ignition Propensity and it failed.

Reduced Ignition Propensity for cigarettes is a safety issue and constitutes an offence under the General Product Safety Regulations 2005.

## **Recomemendations:**

#### Permanent revocation of the alcohol licence.

Reason for the above recommendation:

The licensee is a repeat offender and the extant offences are of such a serious nature as to justify the revocation of the licence.

The licensee has demonstrated a propensity to commit criminal offences (previous licence suspension refers) and is not a fit and proper person to hold a premises licence.

Trading Standards as a responsible authority recommends revocation due to the seriousness of these offences.

This is supported by guidance issued under section 182 of the Licensing Act 2003.

11.27 There is a certain criminal activity that may arise in connection with licensed premises, which the Secretary of State considers should be treated particularly Seriously.

One of them being: for the sale of smuggled tobacco and alcohol.

11.28 Guidance states- It is envisaged that licensing authorities, the Police and other Law Enforcement Agencies, which are responsible authorites will use the review procedures to effectively deter such activities in crime. Where reviews arise and the licensing authority determines that the crime prevention objective is being undermined through the premises being used to further crimes, it is expected that revocation of the licence, even in the first instance, should be seriously considered.

## On 16<sup>th</sup> May 2014 the Licensing Panel Suspended the Premise Licence for 28 days

## **Summary of facts**

On 23<sup>rd</sup> September 2013 an inspection by the Trading Standards Service was carried out to clamp down on illicit tobacco.

The Trading Standards Service seized: 16180 cigarettes and 1.75kg hand rolling tobacco

The evaded duty on 16180 cigarettes was £4611.30 and on 1.75kg hand rolling tobacco was £395.50

On 11<sup>th</sup> February 2014 a further seizure, assisted by HMRC, was made consisting

10160 cigarettes and 4.35kg hand rolling tobacco

The evaded cuty on 10160 cigarettes was £2095.60 And on 4.35kg hand rolling tobacco was £971.80

HM Revenue and Customs (HMRC) were satisfied that United Kingdom Excise Duty had not been paid on the said goods the total evasion being £8074.20.

The goods were seized in accordance with section 139 of the Customs & Excise Management Act 1979.

No notice of claim against forfeiture was received within the statutory time limit therefore the tobacco was condemed and forteited in accordance with paragraph 5 schedule 3 to the above legislation.

Witness statement S Dibble, Trading Standards, is attached as Appendix 1 Witness statement F Ozturk, Trading Standards, is attached as Appendix 2 Witness statement M Clark, HMRC, is attached as Appendix 3

The Trading Standards Service recomemended a revocation of the alcohol licence.

The Panel suspended the licence for 28 days.

I am a Senior Enforcement Officer with Luton Borough Council Trading Standards and am authorised to enforce to enforce the Consumer Protection Act 1987, the Tobacco Products (Manufacture, Presentation and Sale) (Safety) Regulations 2002 and the Trade Marks Act 1994.

On the 11<sup>th</sup> February 2016, following information received that a premises was selling foreign labelled tobacco, I attended the premises of Luton International Supermarket, 9 Wellington Street, Luton, LU1 2QH. I was accompanied by my colleague Dawn MASSIE, an Investigations Support Officer. We arrived at the premises at 11.15 a.m whereby I met with a person I now know to be the owner Mehmet DOGAN. I showed him my warrant ID card and explained our reasons for attending, i.e., that we had received information he was selling foreign labelled tobacco products and that I intended to do an inspection.

I carried out the inspection in the back areas of the premises and discovered 3 x packs of 10 of foreign labelled Golden Virginia 50g packets of tobacco in a downstairs stockroom. I handed these to Ms MASSIE who entered the details onto a 'RECORD OF ARTICLES SEIZED', herein known as the 'seizure log'

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and placed them into a sealed bag with seal number P00070134. I produce these 3 packets of 10 as exhibits MAS/1/1-3 respectively.

On searching under the counter, I saw a microwave there which I couldn't open. I asked Mr DOGAN to open it, which after fiddling with the mechanism, he managed to get the door open. In the microwave were 33 packets of various brands of foreign labelled cigarettes. I produce these items as exhibit MAS/2/1-33 respectively. I handed these to Ms MASSIE who entered them onto the seizure log and placed them into a sealed bag with seal number P00070133. She also completed a 'Notice of Powers and Rights' form. Mr DOHAN tried to explain that the items belonged to a member of his staff and were nothing to do with him. I reminded him that foreign labelled and/or illicit tobacco products should not be in the premises.

I seized these items and handed Mr DOGAN a 'Schedule 5 Consumer Rights Act — Entry Notice', a copy of which I produce as exhibit MAS/3. I handed Mr DOGAN the seizure log and Notice of Powers and Rights form to sign. He signed them and I gave him a copy of both of them. I now produce these documents as exhibits MAS/4 and MAS/5 respectively. We left the premises at 11.55a.m. whereby on our return to the office, placed the exhibits into secure storage.

On the 23<sup>rd</sup> February 2016, I visited a number of premises in relation to an illicit tobacco operation. One of these was Luton International Supermarket which I visited with my colleague Stephen DIBBLE, the Trading Standards Team Leader and a representative from Wagtail UK Ltd Chris along with his sniffer dog. We arrived at the premises at 10.15a.m. On searching the premises, there was a carton of 10 packets of foreign labelled Marlboro on top of the microwave under the counter. Inside the microwave were a further 33 packets of foreign labelled cigarettes. I took photographs of the items.

I seized these items and handed Mr DOGAN a 'Schedule 5 Consumer Rights Act – Entry Notice', a copy of which I produce as exhibit MAS/6. I handed Mr

DOGAN the seizure log and Notice of Powers and Rights form to sign. He signed them and I gave him a copy of both of them. I now produce these documents as exhibits MAS/7 and MAS/8 respectively. 

I am authorised to make this declaration on behalf of Imperial Tobacco Ltd. and I do so from my own knowledge unless otherwise indicated.

I have been employed by Imperial Tohacco Ltd since August 2007 and I am fully trained in the identification of Imperial Tohacco owned brands.

On 17th February 2016 at the offices of Luton Trading Standards I spoke to Ramesh Patel and examined the following products:

 30x50g packs of Golden Virginia hand rolled tobacco in bag P00070134. After examination they were all returned to Ramesh Patel and placed in the same bag.

The print and materials used in the manufacture of all of the above products is not consistent with Imperial Tobacco Ltd specifications.

I produce copies of the Trade Mark certificates in respect of this brand. (Exhibit SH1).

I can say that while our tobacco is produced to certain consistent standards as regards Nicotine and Carbon Monoxide content, the content of counterfeit tobacco is unregulated.

I am willing to support any action deemed necessary by trading standards and I am prepared to attend Court.

On the 8<sup>th</sup> March 2016, the laboratory received a sample of Bond Street Filter Cigarettes from Ramesh Patel of Luton Trading Standards in a sealed evidence bag with the identification number \$00105480. The cigarettes were tested against the provisions of BS EN ISO 12863:2010 for Reduced Ignition Propensity and the report LT909 was compiled of which I introduce as exhibit SJL-1. This report shows the sample failed the requirement of the standard. In my opinion this sample would not meet the General Product Safety Requirement in that a discarded cigarette would pose a risk of fire by not self-extinguishing as required by the standard. The packaging of the sample was placed into a sealed evidence bag with the identification number S00105481, and returned to Luton Trading Standards on March 10<sup>th</sup> 2016. \



# **Description and identification:**

Two packs of Bond Street 20 Filter Cigarettes submitted in a sealed evidence bag with the identification number S0010580.

#### Methodology:

Samples boxes are opened and the contents removed and left for 24 hours to acclimatise to the environmental conditions of 20 degrees Celsius and a relative humidity of 50%. Whatman grade 2, 150 mm filter papers are previously conditioned for 8 hours in groups of 10.

The test chamber is to be placed centrally in the fume cupboard with the access door towards the opening. The substrate holder is placed into the test chamber on blocks raising it 20 mm from the floor. The 10 filter papers are to be placed in the holder and the weighting ring added. The appropriate wires are added to prevent the cigarette rolling during the test.

Take the first cigarette to be tested and from the non filter end mark a line 5 mm on the seam with a soft pencil. Mark another line 15 mm from the end. Ignite the cigarette and rotate until there is an even burn and when it has reached the 5 mm line transfer the holder into the test chamber.

When the cigarette burn has reached the 15 mm line remove from the holder and place onto the filter paper substrate with the filter end between the wires to prevent rolling and the seam facing up. Close the chamber door and open the chimney of the test chamber. There should be an undisturbed plume of smoke if the chamber is set up correctly.

The cigarette is left until it extinguishes, at the filter junction which is a fail or along the column before it reaches the filter junction which is a pass. A pass is defined if 75% of the 40 test pieces self extinguishes.







# **Description and identification:**

Two packs of Bond Street 20 Filter Cigarettes submitted in a sealed evidence bag with the identification number S0010589.

# Methodology:

Samples boxes are opened and the contents removed and left for 24 hours to acclimatise to the environmental conditions of 20 degrees Celsius and a relative humidity of 50%. Whatman grade 2, 150 mm filter papers are previously conditioned for 8 hours in groups of 10.

The test chamber is to be placed centrally in the fume cupboard with the access door towards the opening. The substrate holder is placed into the test chamber on blocks raising it 20 mm from the floor. The 10 filter papers are to be placed in the holder and the weighting ring added. The appropriate wires are added to prevent the cigarette rolling during the test.

Take the first cigarette to be tested and from the non filter end mark a line 5 mm on the seam with a soft pencil. Mark another line 15 mm from the end. Ignite the cigarette and rotate until there is an even burn and when it has reached the 5 mm line transfer the holder into the test chamber.

When the cigarette burn has reached the 15 mm line remove from the holder and place onto the filter paper substrate with the filter end between the wires to prevent rolling and the seam facing up. Close the chamber door and open the chimney of the test chamber. There should be an undisturbed plume of smoke if the chamber is set up correctly.

The cigarette is left until it extinguishes, at the filter junction which is a fail or along the column before it reaches the filter junction which is a pass. A pass is defined if 75% of the 40 test pieces self extinguishes.





On the 23<sup>rd</sup> September 2013, following receipt of information that Luton International Stores, 9 Wellington Street, Luton, was selling illicit tobacco products, I visited the shop accompanied by Dawn Massle in order to carry out an inspection of their store of tobacco products.

I entered the shop at around 11:45am and introduced myself to a person who gave his name as Mehmet DOGAN. Mr DOGAN stated he was the owner of the premises. On the floor in boxes behind the counter of the shop I found a large quantity of mixed tobacco products which had warning labelling in a language other than English.

I therefore believed that offences had been committed in respect of the labelling under the Tobacco Products (Manufacture, Presentation and Sale) (Safety) Regulations 2002, regulation 14 and Consumer Protection Act 1987 section 12 and I informed Mr DOGAN I would be seizing the products.

I cautioned Mr DOGAN and asked him to confirm he was the owner, which he did. I asked him where the tobacco came from and he responded that it was from people who came into his shop. I asked how much he palded and he responded less than £40 for 10 packs. I asked if he had any contact details for the sellers and he said no.

The tobacco was sealed in bags and Mr DOGAN was given a receipt which I produce as exhibit SJI

I am employed by Luton Borough Council Trading Standards Service as an Enforcement Officer and as such I am authorised to enforce the provisions of The Trade Marks Act 1994, The Consumer Protection Act 1987 and the regulations made under such as The Tobacco Products (Manufacture, Presentation and Sale) (Safety) Regulations 2002 as amended.

On the 11<sup>th</sup> February 2014 as part of a joint operation with the HMRC at around 10.10 am I visited a business on 9<sup>th</sup> Wellington Street in Luton. I was accompanied by Robert Henderson, Principal Trading Standards Officer for Luton Borough Council and Richard Eve and Matt Clark for HMRC.

I introduced myself to this person who was sitting behind the counter. There was no other person working in the shop. I informed him that we were going to check the tobacco products in the shop to ensure that they comply with the law. I also informed him that we previously visited this premises and found many illegal tobacco products. I asked for his business details. The person gave me his business name as Luton International Supermarket Limited and

his name as MEHMET DOGAN and I issued Code B.

Behind the counter area, downstairs, the shop floor were checked by HMRC and found tobacco products without fiscal marks. I and Mr Henderson assisted placing these products in evidence bags and sealing the bags with seals. The seal numbers of the bags were A003750 containing about 2,260 multi brand cigarettes, A003708 containing about 5,700 cigarettes, A003796 containing about 4.3 kg of Hand Rolling Tobacco and A003721 containing about 2,200 cigarettes.

A specialist dog and a dog handler from Wagtail also assisted us in searching for tobacco products.

I saw Mr Clark give Mr DOGAN a seizure information notice for these tobacco products. We removed the bags from the shop about 11 am and placed them in our departmental transit.

On the 6<sup>th</sup> March 2014 at around 14.30 pm I went to departmental store area to identify the tobacco products that was seized by the HMRC on the 11<sup>th</sup> February 2014. I was accompanied by Janis Green, Enforcement Officer for Luton Borough Council. I located the bags which were A003750, A003708, A003796 and A003721. Mrs Green assisted me in counting the tobacco products in the bags.

I opened the following bag with seal number A003750 and counted the

cigarettes. They were as follows;

560 cigarettes with the brand name of Mariboro,

180 cigarettes with the brand name of Kent,

320 clgarettes with the brand name of NZ (Gold),

140 cigarettes with the brand name of LD Violet,

260 cigarettes with the brand name of LD (Blue),



Images will be kept for 31 days and will be made available to the police upon reasonable request.
  - a. There will be a colour camera covering the entrance/exit door which will be capable of providing a good quality head and shoulder image of persons leaving the premises.

I am employed by Luton Borough Council as the Trading Standards Team Leader, I am an authorised officer under the Consumer Protection Act 1987.

On the 23<sup>rd</sup> September 2013, following receipt of information that Luton International Stores, 9 Wellington Street, Luton, was selling illicit tobacco products, I visited the shop accompanied by Dawn Massie in order to carry out an inspection of their store of tobacco products.

I entered the shop at around 11:45am and introduced myself to a person who gave his name as Mehmet DOGAN. Mr DOGAN stated he was the owner of the premises. On the floor in boxes behind the counter of the shop I found a large quantity of mixed tobacco products which had warning labelling in a language other than English.

I therefore believed that offences had been committed in respect of the labelling under the Tobacco Products (Manufacture, Presentation and Sale) (Safety) Regulations 2002, regulation 14 and Consumer Protection Act 1987 section 12 and I informed Mr DOGAN I would be seizing the products.

I cautioned Mr DOGAN and asked him to confirm he was the owner, which he did. I asked him where the tobacco came from and he responded that it was from people who came into his shop. I asked how much he paided and he responded less than £40 for 10 packs. I asked if he had any contact details for the sellers and he said no.

The tobacco was sealed in bags and Mr DOGAN was given a receipt which I produce as exhibit SJP4

I am employed by Luton Borough Council Trading Standards Service as an Enforcement Officer and as such I am authorised to enforce the provisions of The Trade Marks Act 1994, The Consumer Protection Act 1987 and the regulations made under such as The Tobacco Products (Manufacture, Presentation and Sale) (Safety) Regulations 2002 as amended.

On the 11<sup>th</sup> February 2014 as part of a joint operation with the HMRC at around 10.10 am I visited a business on 9<sup>th</sup> Wellington Street in Luton. I was accompanied by Robert Henderson, Principal Trading Standards Officer for Luton Borough Council and Richard Eve and Matt Clark for HMRC.

I introduced myself to this person who was sitting behind the counter. There was no other person working in the shop. I informed him that we were going to check the tobacco products in the shop to ensure that they comply with the law. I also informed him that we previously visited this premises and found many illegal tobacco products. I asked for his business details. The person gave me his business name as Luton International Supermarket Limited and

his name as MEHMET DOGAN and I issued Code B.

Behind the counter area, downstairs, the shop floor were checked by HMRC and found tobacco products without fiscal marks. I and Mr Henderson assisted placing these products in evidence bags and sealing the bags with seals. The seal numbers of the bags were A003750 containing about 2,260 multi brand cigarettes, A003708 containing about 5,700 cigarettes, A003796 containing about 4.3 kg of Hand Rolling Tobacco and A003721 containing about 2,200 cigarettes.

A specialist dog and a dog handler from Wagtail also assisted us in searching for tobacco products.

I saw Mr Clark give Mr DOGAN a seizure information notice for these tobacco products. We removed the bags from the shop about 11 am and placed them in our departmental transit.

On the 6<sup>th</sup> March 2014 at around 14.30 pm I went to departmental store area to identify the tobacco products that was seized by the HMRC on the 11<sup>th</sup> February 2014. I was accompanied by Janis Green, Enforcement Officer for Luton Borough Council. I located the bags which were A003750, A003708, A003796 and A003721. Mrs Green assisted me in counting the tobacco products in the bags.

I opened the following bag with seal number A003750 and counted the

cigarettes. They were as follows;

560 cigarettes with the brand name of Marlboro,

180 cigarettes with the brand name of Kent,

320 cigarettes with the brand name of NZ (Gold),

140 cigarettes with the brand name of LD Violet,

260 cigarettes with the brand name of LD (Blue),

320 cigarettes with the brand name of LM (Blue),

280 cigarettes with the brand name of LM (Green),

80 cigarettes with the brand name of Camel,

20 cigarettes with the brand name of Marble (Gold) and

100 cigarettes with the brand name of Lifa.

The total number of cigarettes was 2,260. We placed them in a new bag including the old bag and the seal and resealed the bag with the seal number of A003782.

I opened bag number A003708 and counted the cigarettes. They were as follows;

2,000 cigarettes with the brand name of Marlboro,

200 cigarettes with the brand name of LD,

200 cigarettes with the brand name of Kent,

400 cigarettes with the brand name of Queen Menthol,

800 cigarettes with the brand name of Marlboro (Red),

400 cigarettes with the brand name of Lifa,

400 cigarettes with the brand name of Kent,

200 cigarettes with the brand name of LM Link,

200 cigarettes with the brand name of LD Violet,

400 cigarettes with the brand name of NZ (Gold) and

The total number of cigarettes was 5,720. We placed them in a new bag including the old bag and the seal and resealed the bag with the seal number of A003711.

I opened the bag number A003796 and counted the hand rolling tobacco products and there were 4 kg 350 g of Golden Virginia products and we placed them in a new bag including the old bag and the seal. I resealed the bag with the seal number of A003789.

I counted the cigarettes in the bag with the seal number of A003721 without opening the bag. There were 2,200 cigarettes with the brand name of LD.

I logged them in the book kept in the store. At around 15.30 we left the store.

On the 10<sup>th</sup> March 2014 at around 12.20 pm I went to departmental store area to identify the tobacco products seized on the 23<sup>rd</sup> of September 2013 by Stephen Dibble, Trading Standards Service Team Leader for Luton Borough Council. I was accompanied by Dawn Massie, Investigation Support Officer and Ramesh Patel Enforcement Officer for Luton Borough Council. We located the bags which were with seal numbers of R00117677, R00117674, R00117676 and R00117644. Ms Massie and Mr Patel assisted me in counting the tobacco products in the bags.

We first opened the bag with seal number of R00117677 and the tobacco products were in a box. We emptied the box and counted the cigarettes. They were as follows;

400 cigarettes with the brand name of Lifa Menthol (Superslim),

200 cigarettes with the brand name of L&M Link Mint,

200 cigarettes with the brand name of L&M Link (Blue),

I put the cigarettes into a Tamper Evidant Bag (TEB) displaying seal numbers A003750. I then warned the owner about selling non UK duty paid cigarettes. At 10.25 hours I seized the cigarettes and issued a Seizure Notice and Warning Letter. An additional search was conducted with a tobacco dog and more non UK duty paid excise goods were found, namely 7900 (KSF) cigarettes and 4.35 kilograms of tobacco. The cigarettes were placed in Temper Evidant Bags displaying seal numbers A003708, A003721, and the hand rolling tobacco was placed in TEB A003796. These excise goods were seized at 10.55 hours. I left the premises at 11.00 hours. The total quantity of cigarettes seized was Ten thousand one hundred sixty cigarettes (10,160) and 4.35 kilograms of hand rolling tobacco. # 57. APPLICATION FOR REVIEW OF PREMISES LICENCE - LUTON INTERNATIONAL SUPERMARKET, 9 WELLINGTON STREET, LUTON (REF: 6)

The Chair introduced the Panel.

The Clerk to the Panel explained the procedure at oral hearings before the Council's Licensing Panel to those parties present.

The Licensing Manager's representative reported on an application received from Ramesh Patel of Trading Standards for the review of the premises licence in respect of Luton International Supermarket, 9 Wellington Street Luton.

The Licence Holder and his representative were in attendance as listed above. The Licensing Manager's representative reported that no representations had been received from other persons or Responsible Authorities, relating to the Licensing Objectives.

There were no questions from the Panel or the Licence Holder for the Licensing Manager's representative.

The Applicant spoke in support of his application, presenting key aspects of the evidence as submitted in Appendix B to the report of the Licensing Manager's representative (Ref: 6). He further requested that additional documentary evidence, which had been served on the Licence Holder, be considered by the Panel. The document, an additional statement from Figen Ozturk, with photographic evidence of tobacco products seized on 11<sup>th</sup> February, was accepted and examined by the Panel.

The Applicant re-iterated the Guidance issued under the Licensing Act 2003, which stated crime including the sale of smuggled tobacco and alcohol should be treated seriously and in an application to review the premises licence, revocation of the licence should be seriously considered, even in the first instance. On that basis he requested that the Panel consider revoking the premises licence. He added the applicant had said at Magistrates' Court that the cigarettes and tobacco seized were for personal use and use by friends and family.

The Applicant was questioned by the Panel and responded in compliance with the approved procedure, providing further clarification as follows:

- There were 2 visits to the premises, on 21<sup>st</sup> September 2013 and 11<sup>th</sup> February 2014, when illegal tobacco products were seized;
- The Licence holder was informed why the seizures were made;
- No test purchase had been carried out;
- The cigarettes were found under the counter and hidden under other produce;
- The visits were as a result of intelligence received;
- The licence holder had admitted when questioned to selling the cigarettes for £4.00 to £4.50 a packet.

The applicant was then questioned by Mr Worral, the Licence Holder's representative and responded in compliance with the approved procedure, providing further clarifications as follows:

- The charges and conviction of the Licensee was for failing to display health warnings on the cigarette packets, not for evading duty;
- There were two charges for the whole amount of cigarettes seized;
- The Licensee had admitted to Mr Clarke of Her Majesty's Revenue and Customs (HMRC), that he only sold 15 packets of cigarettes;
- The tobacco products were hidden under the counter and under other produce;
- His source of intelligence could not be revealed;
- HMRC only prosecute for evasion of duty of over £10,000;
- He could not provide any evidence other than what was in the statements about whether the tobacco products were smuggled or not.

Mr Worral then spoke in support of the Licence Holder making the following key points:

- Mr Dogan, the Licensee had been at the Wellington Street Store for some time and this was the only offence against him;
- The premises had been well run, with no complaints in respect of drunkenness and alcohol sale;
- The current premises had played a part in re-vitalising Wellington Street and Mr Dogan wished to keep standards up;
- He had pleaded guilty and been fined;
- Friends had brought in the cigarettes from abroad, not smuggled;
- Mr Dogan was a good citizen and the licensed premises was the sole source of income for him and his family;
- Mr Dogan accepted there would be a penalty, but requested that the Panel did not revoke his licence, as this would remove his livelihood.

The Licence Holder was questioned by the Panel and his representative responded in compliance with the approved procedure, providing further information as follows:

- It was not Mr Dogan's intention to evade duty, but he accepted duty was payable on the 15 packs of cigarettes he had sold;
- Mr Dogan accepted HMRC had penalised him by the seizure of the cigarettes and tobacco, although he was not prosecuted due to HMRC's threshold for prosecution;
- The cigarettes and tobacco were not intended for sale to the general public, only to those who understood the language;
- The cigarettes and tobacco were brought in by friends and family through their normal allowance, not smuggled;
- Although he had done it again after the first seizure because people had deposited goods with him, he did not wish to lose his licence and will not do it again;

The Licence Holder was questioned by the Applicant and his representative responded in compliance with the approved procedure, providing further information as follows:

- The cigarettes and tobacco had been found under the counter;
- Mr Dogan had pleaded guilty at Magistrates' Court.

The Licence Holder was questioned by the Licensing Officer and he responded in compliance with the approved procedure, providing further information as follows:

- He stated he had been told by Trading Standards on the first occasion that he could not sell the cigarettes and tobacco;
- The letter sent by Trading Standards went to his old address.

The Applicant summed up as follows:

- Illegal cigarettes and tobacco had been on sale and were seized when the premises had been visited on two occasions after receiving intelligence;
- He requested the premises licence be revoked.

Mr Worral for the Licence Holder, summed up as follows:

- Mr Dogan accepted he had done wrong and pleaded guilty;
- The cigarettes and tobacco were not on display and were for family and friends;
- Mr Dogan was of good character, was very sorry and would not do it again;
- He opposed the application for revocation;
- He accepted there would be some form of penalty, but hoped it would not significantly affect his income.

Both the Applicant and the Licence Holder were given the opportunity to add anything else they wished before the Panel considered its decision, but had nothing further to say.

Members considered whether the public interest in retiring to make their decision in private outweighed the public interest in holding their deliberations in public, in accordance with the Licensing Act 2003 (Hearings) Regulations 2005.

Following discussion by Members, the Panel determined that the public interest of retiring to make their decision in private outweighed the public interest in holding their deliberations in public.

# 58. LICENSING ACT 2003 (HEARINGS) REGULATIONS 2005 (REF: 7)

**Resolved:** That in accordance with regulation 14 of the Licensing Act 2003 (Hearings) Regulations 2005, the public and press be excluded from the meeting during consideration of the decision in relation to the report of the Head of Environmental and Consumer Services (Ref: 6) as referred to at Minute No. 57/14 above.

# 59. LICENSING ACT 2003 (HEARINGS) REGULATIONS 2005 (REF: 7)

**Resolved:** That the public and press be no longer excluded from the meeting.

# 60. APPLICATION FOR REVIEW OF PREMISES LICENCE - LUTON INTERNATIONAL SUPERMARKET, 9 WELLINGTON STREET, LUTON (REF: 6)

The Panel had considered the papers before it including the oral representations made by the Applicant and Mr Worrall on behalf of Mr Dogan, the Licence Holder. In addition the Panel had regard to the licensing objectives set out in the Licensing Act 2003 (the Act), the Council's Statement of Licensing Policy and the Guidance issued under the Act.

**Resolved:** That the application from Ramesh Patel of Trading Standards for the review of the Premises Licence in respect of Luton International Supermarket, 9 Wellington Street Luton be determined as follows:

- (i) That the Premises Licence be suspended for a period of 28 days, the Panel being satisfied that Mr Dogan:
  - Had pleaded guilty to two offences of possessing tobacco products for sale at the premises which failed to display the appropriate health warnings, therefore accepting that he was not permitted to sell those cigarettes in the United Kingdom;
  - b. Had received a sanction from H.M. Revenue and Customs (HMRC) in relation to the evasion of duty, not amounting to a prosecution, but resulting in the forfeiture of the tobacco and its condemnation in accordance with the Customs and Excise Management Act 1979, having made no representations to HMRC that duty had been paid;
  - c. Had admitted paying money for the cigarettes and had received money for selling 15 packets on which UK duty had not been paid;
  - d. Had been visited in September 2013 when tobacco products were seized and he was advised of the fact that he could not sell them, then he went on to do it again and was once more the subject of similar action in February 2014. The Panel found that to be an aggravating factor, demonstrating his knowledge that his actions were unlawful.

In making their decision the Panel considered the content of Paragraphs 11.26 to 11.28 of the guidance issued under Section 182 of the Act and expressed their view that, should Mr Dogan appear before them again in relation to similar matters, it might be appropriate to take further action which could include revocation of his licence.

Mr Dogan was advised the 28 days suspension would begin 21 days after the date on which the decision letter is delivered to him, or if he chose to appeal, then the period of suspension would commence from the date on which that appeal was finally dealt with by the Court, unless the Court found in his favour.

# General Information

Every Premises Licences states the name and address of the individual(s) or organisation which holds that licence Should control of the licensed premises change to a different individual(s) or organisation, it will be necessary to notify the licensing authority by applying for the transfer of the licence

### Criteria

27

The criteria for a licence-holder are as follows

A licence-holder can be an individual (or individuals), a limited company, a partnership, unincorporated association or a similar organisation (e.g. a statutory corporation), a members club, a charity, the proprieter of an educational establishment or another person carrying out statutory functions

Any individual holding a Premises licence must be over the age of 18 years

If an individual, company, corporation or partnership wishes to hold a Premises licence, they must be engaged in a business involving the use of the premises for licensable activities, or proposing to do so Proof of this status can be requested by the licensing authority - for example, by showing a business lease. A person without the legal right to occupy and utilise a premises may not hold a licence for that premises

# Applying to Transfer the Premises Licence

To apply for the transfer of your premises licence, the new licence-holder will need to complete the prescribed form (which can be obtained from the addresses below) Additionally, the previous licence-holder should sign a form showing that they consent to the transfer of the licence

The application should be made as follows

- The completed application form, together with the prescribed fee of £23, should be posted to the Licensing Service at the address below Electronic or faxed copies are not acceptable
- A copy of the completed application form should be sent to the Licensing Officer, Bedfordshire Police, Buxton Road, Luton, LU1 1SD at the same time

Should the Police raise objections to your application within 14 days from the date of application, based around issues relating to Crime & Disorder, the application will be referred to the Councils' Licensing Panel for determination. No other body may object to this type of application
