10. APOLOGY FOR ABSENCE (REF: 1)

An apology for absence from the meeting was received on behalf of Councillor T. Khan.

11. MINUTES (REF: 2.1)

Resolved: That the Minutes of the meetings of the Board held on the 20th March and 20th May 2014 be taken as read, approved as correct records and the Chair be authorised to sign them.

12. MAJOR TRANSPORT PROJECT UPDATE

The Major Projects Manager gave an update on the Luton Town Centre Transport Scheme and the M1 Junction 10a Improvement Scheme.

Luton Town Centre Transport Scheme:

- A new section of road had been built completing the inner ring road between Hucklesby Way, Hitchin Road, Crescent Road and Crawley Road.
- Hitchin Road would be re-opened week commencing 16th June 2014.
- Crawley Road would be closed for a four week period to complete the road bridge over the railway line.
- All Works to the inner ring road would be completed in July 2014.

Bute Street & Guildford Street Pedestrian Improvement Works

- The key aim of the works was to push traffic away from the Town Centre to allow pedestrian improvements which would include an improved route to and from High Town.
- The pedestrian area would include the closure of Guildford Street and part closure of Bute Street.

M1 Junction 10A

- Works would be completed in summer 2015.
- Works included a new bridge to enable a quicker route from the M1 to the airport.
- During peak periods, two lanes would be open during construction.

Luton Gateway Rail & Bus Station

- The Council had been lobbying the Government for a new station with improved DDA Access.
- Funding had been awarded to the sum of £8.5 million.
- It was estimated that works would cost over £10 million.
- Discussions would take place between Network Road, the Department of Transport and the new rail operator.
- To enable the ground works for the planned Transport Information Centre it would be necessary to close the route between the station and Bute Street for approximately 2 3 weeks.

Resolved: That the Major Transport Project update be noted.

13. WARDOWN PARK SUSPENSION BRIDGE REFURBISHMENT

The Parks & Cemeteries Manager informed Central Luton Area Board that at its meeting on Monday 9th June, the Executive had agreed to fund the refurbishment of the Wardown Park Suspension Bridge with £308Kfrom the £4m savings underspend from 2013/14.

Two options had been designed and submitted to English Heritage for approval:

Option1 - Refurbishment

- Replace timber decking and stringers.
- Minor repairs to deck steel.
- Remove existing paint and repaint all metalwork. Colour to match original 1908 construction (white).
- Repair cracks to concrete towers with similar concrete finish to existing structure.
- Replace hanger plate to lower end hangers.
- Replace lower bolt at hanger/cable connection.
- Replace corroded deck bracing members.
- Replace weak or corroded transverse members.
- Replace saddles.
- New bolted splice joints.

Option 2 - Deck Replacement & Remedial Works

- Repair cracks to concrete towers with similar concrete finish to existing.
- Retain cables and hangers tensioned against deck and repaint.

- Replace deck with Modern steel deck spanning between towers.
 Differences from original will be: Rivet heads not to be replicated. Top and bottom chord members of increased size.
- Install new concrete plinth to support ends of deck.
- Repairs to approach ramps.
- Repair saddles.

The preferred option by English heritage was Option 1. He added that the project would be put out to tender and the selected contractor would start works early 2015.

Resolved: That the Report be noted.

- Cleaning of drains, gullies and removal of weeds in St. Michaels Crescent required.

Biscot Ward:

- Parking problems, anti-social behaviour, congestion and drugs in Biscot Road by the Co-op.
- Noise and disturbance at night from customers of the Biscot Mill Pub.

High Town Ward:

- Police updated residents on persistent issues in the area.
- Parking on pavements in the area known as the Halves.
- High Town Festival 5th July 2014

Saints Ward:

No issues to report.

Resolved: That feedback on the top key issues from the Ward Forums be noted.

15. PUBLIC QUESTION TIME (REF: 5)

Resolved: questions from the public this time.

16. HEALTHWATCH LUTON GP REVIEW (REF: 8)

The Healthwatch Luton Project Officer and Dr. Nina Pearson presented the report (Ref: 8), on the GP Review – Report and Recommendations, which was jointly prepared with Luton Clinical Commissioning Group.

Setting the context, he explained Healthwatch's independent status as an organisation championing the causes of patients in health and social care, with power to review services and make recommendations for change.

He added the review of GP services in Luton was conducted with unannounced visits to all 39 GP Practices in Luton, complemented by a survey of around 1000 patients. Some key findings/ issues were as follows:

- 50% of patients could not get a GP appointment when they needed to;
- 40% said they were unable to get through to their surgeries on the phone;
- Only 9% of Practices had disabled access;
- On the positive side, 90% of patients were happy with their care;
- 80% would recommend their GP to their family and friends;
- 70% rated their GPs as very good or excellent;
- 680 recommendations made, half of which GPs had committed to implement and the remainder being subject of on-going negotiations with them;
- Data for North Luton were provided in the report (Ref: 7);
- Many issues requiring funding could not be addressed in Luton, as NHS England responsible for commissioning GP services, not Luton CCG;
- NHS England had been requested to invest in Luton to enable the Healthwatch recommendations to be implemented;

The Project Officer re-emphasised the 8 recommendations in the report to the Board, requesting support to put pressure on NHS England to invest in Luton.

He proceeded to respond to questions, providing further information as follows:

- 800 out of the 1000 patients surveyed were from outside the GP Practices, with others from events;
- The full report could be found on Healthwatch Luton website;
- GP using 0844 and 0845 telephone numbers had been requested to cease and use local numbers. Many had already agreed to do so;
- 1:1 cessions being held with GP Practices regarding the 50% of the recommendations not accepted from the outset. A further update report would be produced when done;
- Some GP Practices were very willing to respond, some were not so professional;
- The issue of patients failing to keep appointments was considered, but as not all GP Practices kept data, was not included as part of report;

- Text messaging used to remind patients of appointments appeared to be an effective measure to reduce the rate of failure to show for appointments;
- Healthwatch Luton was trying to get NHS England to fund automatic doors at GP Practices to improve disabled access;
- 28 of GP Practices did not have a separate room at Reception where patients could discuss their private and confidential issues with staff;
- Patients did not have to respond to questions on private and confidential issues put by receptionists.

Councillors and members of the public were informed that a report for each GP had been created and included a response from the surgery along with their timescales for implementing the recommendations issued by Helathwatch Luton, which could be viewed online at www.healthwatchluton.co.uk/gp-report.

The Chair thanked the project Officer for the report and moved that the Board and members of the public present should fully support the Healthwatch recommendations as requested, which was unanimously agreed.

Resolved: (i) That the Healthwatch Luton GP Review – Report and Recommendations (Ref: 8) be noted and its recommendations to the Board fully supported;

(ii) That the Board's thanks to Kay Kokabi, the Healtwatch Luton Project Officer be recorded.

17. 'YOU SAID, WE'RE DOING' - NEWSLETTER: CENTRAL LUTON AREA (REF: 9)

The Neighbourhood Governance Manager presented his report (Ref: 9), providing an overview of priorities for the area.

Members attention was drawn to the following areas:

- Introduction of body worn cameras by Bedfordshire Police.
- The successful recruitment of two Neighbourhood Support Officers.
- Project to help reduce social isolation.
- Clear-up operations conducted by the High Town Team.
- Introduction of the Luton Speakers Club by the Centre for Youth and Community Development (CYCD)

Resolved: That the report of the Neighbourhood Governance Project Manager (Ref: 9) providing an overview of priorities for the area be noted.

18. AREA REPORT (REF: 10)

The Area Board Support Officer presented his report (Ref: 10), updating the Board on budgetary issues since its last meeting, for noting, recommendations and decisions on further actions, as required.

<u>PURPOSE</u>

1. To report to Central Luton Area Board the receipt of a petition against the parking of commercial vehicles in residential areas.

RECOMMENDATION(S)

- 2. Central Luton Area Board is recommended to:-
 - (i) note receipt of the petition;
 - (ii) note that there is no legislation to prevent recovery vehicles from parking in residential areas.
 - (iii) instruct the Head of Engineering and Street Services to advise the petitioners that there is no legislation to prevent recovery vehicles from parking in residential areas.

BACKGROUND

- 3. A petition has been received stating "We, the residents of Solway Road South, urge Luton Borough Council and Luton MPs to examine the issues arising from the increasing number of commercial vehicles left permanently parked on public roads. The attached photos shows examples of commercial vehicles parked on public roads without any consideration to safety and comfort of neighbouring residents. The owners of some of these vehicles do not even live or operate their businesses in the streets or neighbourhoods where they leave their vehicles. And they do not use their own premises to park their vehicles. We believe it is extremely unethical and unfair practice. The Government has a duty to protect the public and enforce law and order.
- 4. Attached to the petition is a sheet containing photographs of the offending vehicles which are recovery vehicles. The sheet also details the problem more specifically, "it is becoming increasingly common for local vehicle breakers and repair garages owners / operators to leave their commercial trucks loaded with unsightly broken down vehicle bodies and carcases on public roads"
- 5. The petition is signed by 16 residents of Solway Road South.

REPORT

- 6. Vehicles weighing over 3.5 tonnes may be required to have an operator's licence under the Goods Vehicles (Licensing of Operators) Act 1995 (as amended). One of the conditions of an operator's licence is generally that the vehicle is kept in the operators operating centre when not in use.
- 7. There are various exemptions to the above requirement and Schedule 3 of the Goods Vehicles (Licensing of Operators) Act 1995 lists 29 different classes of vehicles for which a licence is not required. Item No 27 is for a recovery vehicle.
- 8. The Vehicles Excise and Registration Act 1994 defines a recovery vehicle as "a vehicle which is constructed or permanently adapted primarily for any one or more of the purposes of lifting, towing and transporting a disabled vehicle"
- 9. The Vehicle & Operators Services Agency's Guide for recovery operations adds to the Vehicles Excise and Registration Act 1994 definition of a recovery vehicle by stating "in physical construction this means that a recovery vehicle could be anything from a heavy wrecker, to a flatbed with ramps and winch to a transit van and tow dolly" The Guide goes on further to say that a recovery vehicle must be used for one of the following purposes "the removal of a disabled vehicle from the place where it became disabled to premises at which it is to be repaired or scrapped" or "the removal of a disabled vehicle from premises to which it was taken for repair to other premises at which it is to be repaired or scrapped".

- 10. It is clear from the above that the vehicles described by the petitioners are recovery vehicles and therefore, regrettably, exempt from the Goods Vehicles (Licensing of Operators) Act 1995.
- 11. The Road Traffic Regulation Act 1984 allows highway authorities to prohibit or restrict the use of heavy commercial vehicles in their areas by way of a Traffic Regulation Order. Section 138 of the act defines heavy commercial vehicles as "any goods vehicle which has an operating weight exceeding 7.5 tonnes". However, the photographs submitted with the petition show vehicles that have an operating weight of less than 7.5 tonnes therefore weight limiting Traffic Regulation Orders are not an option to prevent parking by these vehicles.
- 12. The Road Traffic Regulation Act 1984 also allows highway authorities to ban parking in some instances in a specific area. However, to prevent parking by a specific class of vehicle would necessitate a complex scheme that would adversely affect residents, require a level of enforcement that isn't available and would almost certainly move the problem to an adjacent street.
- 13. The Highways Act 1980, Section 137, states that "if a person, without lawful authority or excuse, in any way wilfully obstructs the free passage along a highway he is guilty of an offence and liable to a fine." Each case must be looked at individually and proving obstruction will depend on the size and type of vehicle together with the width and other features of the road. Whilst the parking of these vehicles is undoubtedly inconvenient and anti-social, it is unlikely that obstruction could be proved, the vehicle size being no different to large vans that are parked in most residential areas these days.
- 14. From the foregoing, it is clear that the vehicles are not operating contrary to any highway related legislation despite it being inconvenient to residents and it being inconsiderate. If Central Luton Area Board feel that this is unreasonable, measures would have to be taken to get the legislation amended.

LEGAL IMPLICATIONS

15. The legal implications are set out in the body of the report. This has been agreed by the Principal Solicitor (Litigation) in Legal Services on 7 October 2014.

PURPOSE

1. The purpose of this report is for Members to consider a petition from residents living in the Moulton Rise area requesting that the Council do not install secure door entry to communal area main doors dated 6th May 2014.

RECOMMENDATION

Central Luton Area Committee is recommended to instruct officers to:

 (i) carry out work to install a secure door entry system to communal main entry doors, with an entry panel at the main entrance and a panel in each property to enable residents to identify visitors

BACKGROUND

3. A copy of a petition has been received from the lead petitioner dated 6th May 2014 from 18 residents of 11 properties out of 27 properties in total, who live in Moulton Rise area of town and request LBC do not install a secure door entry to communal main doors.

REPORT

4. Following the Borough's tenancy audit project, SAP (service area panels) and general feedback surveys, it was highlighted that resident's main top areas of

- concern with regard to their housing were their fuel bills and anti-social behaviour /security.
- 5. As part of the Asset Management Strategy, Planned Improvement programmes are delivered to ensure the Councils stock is maintained to a high level to ensure protection of the Councils assets. Communal main entry doors to the Councils blocks of flats is one of the planned programme streams. The benefit of the programme to residents is that they will be able to identify persons wishing to enter the block before allowing access. This will prevent any unauthorised persons gaining entry into the building. Currently anyone can have free entry into the communal areas.
- 6. Moulton Rise falls within the 2014-2015 improvement programme. There are 13 leaseholder properties and 14 tenant properties in Moulton Rise. 5 leasehold properties and 6 tenanted properties signed the petition. These works are due to be completed February 2015. The consultation process was started 25th April 2014 in line with Section 20 for leaseholders and 19th May for tenants. The benefit of the

Considerations

16. The communal main entrance doors to Moulton Rise currently are not secure entry meaning that all persons have free access into the building.

- 17. Following the hand delivered letter from Ben Burley to all residents in Moulton Rise dated 19th May, Appendix F, fully explaining the extent of the works for clarification purposes and inviting residents to register if they do not wish the works to be carried out, there was 1 negative response from a leasehold resident who did not sign the petition.
- 18. The remaining housing stock in the Borough with communal doors already have secure entry or are programmed in to have secure entry fitted. We have received no negative feedback regarding secure entry other than reports of routine repair works required as necessary.

Further Information for Noting Only

19. The individual flat front doors are planned to be replaced February 2015 at the same time as the communal main doors to reduce the inconvenience of disturbance to residents.

FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

20. Due to manufacturing lead in timescales of works of this nature orders will need to be placed by November 2014 at the very latest to ensure the works are completed this financial year. Due to the budget allocation this financial year, if these works do not proceed an underspend will be realised.

LEGAL IMPLICATIONS

21. Save that there is a potential risk for vandalism and or damages claims against the Council in the event of anti- social behaviour there are no direct legal implications to this report.

I would like to introduce myself; I am the Technical Engineer for the electrical department at BTS. I have been tasked with arranging the fitting of new doors and video door entry systems at all housing blocks owned by LBC.

We are planning to install new hardwood entrance doors and secure video door entry systems to your blocks. This will involve a new door being fitted and door entry handset in each flat.

After consultations with residents of the whole borough last year we were told that security is one of the top concerns for tenants. We have therefore been looking to make all blocks within Luton more secure. We have historically had problems with anti-social behaviour and non residents using unsecured communal areas.

I would like to confirm that there is no CCTV equipment being installed on this project. The only cameras are a small pinhole camera on the door entry panel that will give a picture of who is calling on the handset. This camera only operates when a button is pushed to call a flat. You will then be able to release the entrance door downstairs from your handset.

Deliveries and the post man are not affected as the system is open to trades between the hours of 6am and 12pm.

The doors will have a door handle on the inside so that anyone can leave the block at any time by using the handle. This method is approved by all emergency and fire procedures.

The works will not be due to start for another 4-5 months and I would appreciate anyone that has concerns contacting me on the above number to discuss. 

1. To advise the Board of the process for the identification, prioritisation, selection and delivery of Council Housing environmental projects at ward level; and ask approval from members to proceed with the proposals for projects within their ward area.

BACKGROUND

There is currently an amount of £40,000 allocated for the provision of Housing Environmental Fund projects throughout Luton. This allocation is available for the provision of small improvements on housing land for the benefit of the council tenants in the area. The budget is allocated across the ward on a per council property basis. Wards with less than 100 council housing properties would 'partner' with another ward

The decision on spend will be made by the ward councillors and local tenants, including any tenant representative for that area.

If there is excess budget remaining members can agree for this to be used by another ward to support any possible overspend.

This report gives an overview of progress on addressing community priorities in Central Luton under the themes of 'safer and stronger communities', 'health and wellbeing' and 'environment and economy' as agreed by local people, councillors and council partners as part of the'Your Say, Your Way' programme.











Central area update

Community projects supported through the 'Your Say, Your Way' programme in the Central Luton wards continue to deliver on local priorities. Below is an update on some of these projects:

One Nation Archery Club (Biscot)

The club runs twice a week at Denbigh High School promoting archery to residents across the community. Following the 2012 Olympics there was a noticeable increase in interest levels, particularly from women, so moves were made to cope with the demand and the club was successful in its participatory budgeting (PB) funding application. This has allowed it to expand its operations to hire more space, arrange publicity, improve access to instructors, purchase new equipment and organise first aid courses. They have attracted a number of new female members as a result.

As a sport demanding self discipline, control and concentration, archery has clear benefits to the people taking part. Add to these a range of other health improvements and the benefits are obvious. Female residents have said they have changed their attitudes to their own physical health by taking more care in what they eat, are increasing exercise and looking at other skills they could develop.





On-street sex trade – a year on

SoLUTIONs, Luton's Community Safety Partnership, has been working in the High Town area to tackle the issue of on-street sex trade. The focus of the partnership is working with a broad range of agencies and organisations to address the problems associated with the trade and to reduce the impact and harm on businesses, residents, communities and individuals affected by it; including those who sell sex.

Some notable successes in the first year include:

- levels of reports relating to prostitution decreasing by 67 per cent
- levels of reports relating to other antisocial behaviour decreasing by 71 per cent
- a downward trend in the levels of reported kerb crawling
- twenty women exiting the on-street sex trade.

Cllr Naseem Ayub, Portfolio Holder for community safety at Luton Borough Council, said: "People in Luton, and in particular the Hightown area, have been living with the impacts of the on-street sex trade for too long. It's good to see progress being made on the Community Safety Partnership's five-year strategy for tackling the on-street sex trade in Luton and the ongoing work that is taking place to rid the town of this problem. We all know this is a complex issue requiring committed partnership working over a period of time, and the Council is as dedicated as it ever has been to providing effective and practical measures alongside the police enforcement activity."

The partnership will continue to work hard to tackle the issue and to reach the overall aim of removing the on-street sex trade from Luton by 2018.

Improving GP services

Luton Clinical Commissioning Group has developed a new way of improving GP services in Luton.

The 31 GP practices have formed four clusters, each containing between seven and nine GP practices, with 40,000 – 60,000 patients. The aim is to deliver better jointworking for more joined-up services to Luton patients.

The development of clusters ensures practices come together and are supported in understanding their role as commissioners and to consider how best to improve the health and social care system.

One of the main functions of this new system is the two-way commissioning dialogue between the CCG and practices. GPs are our front-line clinicians and can help to shape commissioning through their day-to-day experience of health and social care services.



Council partners with CCG

A new partnership between Luton Borough Council and Luton Clinical Commissioning Group (CCG) will mean that certain services such as complaints handling and communications will be provided by the local authority.

NHS customers can expect a continuing excellent service from this arrangement which represents better value for the tax payer.

Women-only health and fitness programmes



Active Luton's successful 'Me Time' programme is encouraging more and more women to take part in sport and physical activity.

'Me Time' offers a variety of women-only sports and fitness programmes across the town and in various community settings.

Activities are during the day, in the evening and at weekends so that everyone has the opportunity to participate.

As well as the physical activities, the programme also provides links into coaching and mentoring to help

develop local female leaders, mentors and coaches who can then encourage others to take part.

Helen Barnett, Chief Executive of Active Luton, said: "We are very proud of this programme which ensures more local women are able to improve their health and wellbeing by taking part in sport and physical activity.

"There are a number of reasons why participation levels are low amongst women and this is all about working in a variety of community settings to not only make it easier for them to get involved, but also to give them the confidence to take part."

Hate crime update

A Bedfordshire-wide hate crime strategy was launched in May and Luton has its own action plan. One of the main aims of the strategy is to increase reporting of hate crime.

Hate crime is nationally underreported. In fact, some studies estimate that four times as many hate crimes take place than are reported; other organisations put this figure much higher.

Hate crime includes physical attacks to people or property, threats such as offensive letters or phone calls, verbal abuse and mimicking, arson, graffiti, bullying at work or school and more.

These incidents are motivated by prejudice, bigotry or intolerance on the grounds of disability, ethnicity,

gender, race or ethnicity, religion or belief or sexual orientation.

So far in Luton the work on hate crime has resulted in an increase in the number of incidents reported.

Key work on the action plan includes training frontline council staff and groups within the community. Some local businesses have been contacted including bus companies and taxi firms to raise awareness of hate crime and to advise where to report and get support.

There has also been a Bedfordshirewide communications campaign with new literature available, including an easy read leaflet on reporting hate crime and how victims can get support.

Central area update



NOAH Enterprise: community access to training facilities (High Town)

NOAH Enterprise works throughout Bedfordshire, providing caring, practical and empowering services to those who are temporarily or established rough sleepers, marginalised, socially excluded or have fallen into poverty.

As there is a NOAH shop in High Town that has become a well-respected part of the neighbourhood, it was no surprise that 'Your Say, Your Way' participatory budgeting funding was sought to enable the upstairs area to be made more widely available to the community.

As a training facility it offers courses and taster sessions aimed at helping long-term unemployed people to get back into work, and as an empty space, it is ideal for local groups to hold meetings, youth sessions and other activities. NOAH staff are working very closely with the people of High Town to make sure that they can help where they can.



'IT for Beginners' was one of the courses delivered from the immediate area and 68 local people registered and as a direct result. One of the participants now actually volunteers in the delivery of sessions and is undertaking teacher

training this year. Further courses and workshops are planned and the staff at NOAH are very keen to hear from people in the neighbourhood to see how they can help them.



Keep the burglars away!

SoLUTIONs, Luton's Community Safety Partnership, has launched an initiative to reduce burglaries in High Town and South wards by encouraging residents to make their homes as secure as possible.

Burglary across Luton, including South and High Town wards, continues to decrease and has dropped by 8 per cent compared to last year. The focus of this initiative is to continue this positive trend by focusing its efforts into long term reductions.

The project is focused on specific identified areas within High Town and South wards where it is felt they can have a real impact on reducing burglary. The project was launched in August 2014 and will continue throughout Autumn within these identified target areas.

Cllr Naseem Ayub, Portfolio Holder for community safety at Luton Borough Council, said: "Overall the risk of burglary is small but any burglary is one too many. Reducing burglary is one of SoLUTiONs' highest priorities. We have identified High Town and South wards as areas where extra help for residents would be useful to keep homes and belongings safe."

If you live in the target areas, look out for a leaflet popping through your letterbox in the next few weeks giving details of how to arrange a free home security assessment. Each assessment by the Council, police and fire service officers takes around 30 minutes and they will advise you on ways to improve your home security.

Please note that no officer will visit your home to carry out an assessment without an appointment!

If this pilot burglary reduction initiative is successful, the scheme is likely to be rolled out across Luton.
