REPORT

COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT

Lewsey Community Centre

Staffing

- 3) Lewsey Community Centre despite continued staffing level problems continues to provide a wide programme of activities and events for all the community, which is commendable.

50+ Bowls League

- 4) The 50+ Bowls League started on Friday 15th October and runs every Friday until 15th April 2005. Fourteen teams entered from all over Luton. Staff at Lewsey Centre will send regular updates of positions and scores to date so far in the league, and the latest was sent just before Christmas.
- 5) New fenders have been purchased for the regular meetings of 50+ bowls group and for the League games.
- 6) The annual Mayor's Charity Appeal Short Mat Bowls tournament is due to take place on Saturday 23rd April.

Play schemes

- 7) The October and February half term playschemes were well attended and provided a good mix of activities for the 5-12 year olds of the Area.

Ballet & Tap

- 8) Members of our Ballet & Tap classes worked hard over several months in preparation for their performances in Vanessa's Cinderella Production. There were four shows, which were well attended and well received at the All Saints Church over the October half term period.

Annual Awards

- 9) Another successful Annual Awards evening took place on Saturday 16th October 2004 at Lewsey Community Centre and was attended by approximately 270 people including the new Deputy Mayor Councillor Abid Hussain, M.P. for Luton North Kelvin Hopkins and local Councillor Tom Shaw. Ex England International and Milton Keynes Lions Basketball Player, Leon Noel presented the awards. Fifty-five awards were presented to the children from Ballet & Tap, Gymnastics, Ju Jitsu, Tae Kwondo, Swimming, Cheerleading and Boxing clubs of Lewsey Community Centre. The evening finished off with a disco/karaoke and buffet for all the grandparents, parents and children to enjoy.

Lewsey Community Development

Lewsey Kitchen Garden Project

- 10) Plans are underway to prepare the garden for the long and continuing cold winter, after which re-planting will take place for Summer 2005. In conjunction with North Chilterns Trust, it is hoped that new food growing courses can be arranged for 2005, either at the Learning Centre or at Lewsey Community Centre using the garden for the practical sessions. The Luton & Dunstable Hospitals Dietetic Department, Saheyli group, and CMHSU group remain involved in the upkeep of the garden. Some of the produce during 2004 was used to supplement meals supplied to the CMHSU Group.

Youth Club

- 11) Youth Club started back on the 11th October 2004 and now meets on Mondays and Wednesdays as opposed to Mondays and Tuesdays. The centre and the staff have experienced some problems since it has started back, which hopefully will be resolved through meetings with the Area Youth Worker, Youth Club Workers and staff.

Christmas Fayre

- 12) The Christmas Fayre was held on Saturday 27th November 2004. There were 25 stalls on the day, three of which were given free of charge to local organisations. Over 282 people came through the door and 90 children came to see Father Christmas in his grotto, £451.30 was raised. Most of the staff contributed food and drink to sell in the canteen and this is where 2nd largest amount of money was raised out of the total, the most being raised from the raffle. Members of staff and volunteer workers helped to make the day a success. Money raised at the Fayre helped to fund the Children's Christmas Extravaganza to purchase presents etc. it also helped to fund the Carol Concert and will help to fund further projects and enable the purchase of equipment for the centre.

Carol Concert

- 13) A very successful Carol Concert was held on Sunday 12th December 2004. There was a wonderful turnout of Children along with their families, friends and members of the public. Participants contributing towards the fun filled evening included local schools Halyard High School, Ferrars and Southfields Junior Schools and Chantry Primary School; Huskerettes, Seventh Day Adventists Church, and not forgetting the audience. 200+ people attended the event, including His Worship the Deputy Mayor Councillor Abid Hussain, MP for Luton North Kelvin Hopkins and his wife, also Local Councillor Tom Shaw and his wife. The concert lasted approximately an hour and a quarter and afterwards refreshments were given to all the participating groups and the audience, including mince pies and sherry.

Children's Christmas Extravaganza

- 14) Another successful Children's Christmas party was held at the Lewsey Centre on Tuesday 21st December 2004, 3.00 - 6.00pm. This event was attended by sixty three 5- 10-year-old children. For the first hour Funny Faces Clowning Duo Sonny & Rainbow, performed Circus Skills, magic tricks and Balloon Modelling,

e.t.c. Refreshments including , hotdogs, sweets crisps and drinks were then given to the children. After which their enjoyment continued with games and competitions, during a two hour disco supplied by Funny Faces, Sonny & Rainbow. Three Playleaders helped to make the afternoon run smoothly along with members of staff and volunteers. Last but not least, Father Christmas arrived, and each child received a present from him.

Tsunami Disaster Appeal

- 15) Lewsey Centre, in conjunction with the Friday night Bingo Club, held a special Bingo session during the school half term break. This took place on Tuesday 15th February and raised £132.80 for the Tsunami Appeal.
- 16) Gregis Club organised a range of games and activities at one of their regular monthly meetings, raising £112 for the appeal.
- 17) The Youth Club would like to bake cakes and organise a bring-and-buy sale on a Saturday morning, and once the Centre is given assurances regarding supervision, this will go ahead.

Hockwell Ring Community Centre

Children's Christmas Party

- 18) Centre Staff organised what turned out to be a very successful Children's Christmas Party on 21st December 2004, to which 37 children attended. It was aimed at 5 – 10 year olds. The party included an entertainer, party games, and refreshments. The party ended with Father Christmas bringing presents. The Father Christmas was non other than Mr Bob Baker – Area Youth Officer. All the children appeared to enjoy themselves and the centre has since received an email from a parent thanking staff for organising the party, which staff hope will be just the first of many more.

Local Empowerment Fund Project

- 19) Luton Borough Council Officers are supporting Voluntary Action Luton on this project. If anyone from the Hockwell Ring area is interested in joining the Core Group, please contact the Centre for the meeting date.
- 20) The idea of this project was to develop a Core Group from the Hockwell Ring area that can feed into the Luton Assembly. Voluntary Action Luton also has monies for a one off project for the area and for a part-time Link Worker. The Core Group are looking at what the priorities are for the area, in order to ascertain what the project could be.

Urban Contemporary Dance Classes

- 21) An urban contemporary dance class started a number of weeks ago at the Centre. This is held from 11am – 12noon on Saturday mornings and has proved extremely popular. It is open to children or young people of aged 8 and over.

Bedfordshire Pilgrims Housing Association

- 22) Recently, I met with Cathy Martin – Development Officer for Bedfordshire Pilgrims Housing Association. They are involved in building new houses on the old Electrolux estate. She was interested in collating information to pass on to new residents that will eventually move into these homes.
- 23) I organised for Cathy to meet many local people who are involved with groups in the Hockwell/Leagrave area, and passed on as much information as was possible at the time. However, if anyone has any information that they think may be of use to new residents on activities running locally, please contact me at the centre.

Community Hall Relaunch

- 24) Following the Centres successful Relaunch event for the Community Hall, which was rebuilt following an arson attack in April 2002, centre staff hope to make this an annual event and have provisionally planned to hold the next one on Saturday 16th April 2005. This fun event proved very popular, with many people from the local community coming together to provide, food, competitions, entertainment and displays. It also was a good way of promoting the Centre and the activities that are run there. If anyone has any ideas or would like to take part, please contact the Centre.

Tsunami Disaster Appeal

- 25) Hockwell Ring Community centre have also organised 3 events, these being:
- A bingo session on 5th February 2005, which was heavily supported by the Hockwell Bingo user group. This raised £76.30.
 - A Line Dancing event on 17th February 2005, which raised £36.00
 - A Young Peoples Pool Competition on 18th February 2005, which raised £9.90.

Neighbourhood Renewal

Police Community Support Officer

- 26) Money is now available and advertising of the post will commence shortly. Launch of this initiative is being organised to coincide with the refurbishment in the Dominic's square. So far commitment from all the partners has been tremendous and Lewsey businesses have so far committed their contribution towards the initiative positively.

Capacity Building Funding.

- 27) Applications are ready and organisations will be informed in due cause when to apply.

Social Enterprise Project

- 28) This is a joint venture with Marsh Farm and Lewsey Farm Learning Centre looking at skills in building and construction. So far major progress has been made and information can be obtained at the Lewsey Farm Learning Centre.

Chaul End Community Centre

New Centre

- 29) Works have now started on the building of the new Chaul End Centre, considerable progress has been made and the outlines of the new centre is clearly visible. Work is on target for the building of the centre to be finished the first/second week of August 2005.

Community Porta Cabin

- 30) Adult Education Classes continue to run successfully with two of the customers from Downlands accessing the ladies sewing class on a Tuesday. Although the current classes that run do not offer a qualification at the end of the course if people want to take up the opportunity staff are also looking into other courses run by Adult Education that would offer a qualification.
- 31) Playschemes will continue to run for the younger children 5 – 12 years and will be run by Community Development.
- 32) Officers have had meetings with Job Club Plus regarding holding outreach surgeries at the centre where local people can make appointments to come in and speak to the staff who in turn can help them to access employment. The centre is also looking to hold advice surgeries through various agencies such as Citizen's Advice Bureau, Benefits Advice etc.
- 33) Meetings have been held with the Youth Service and officers are now looking into starting a Youth Drop In Session. Youth Workers will come in a work with the young people and they will have a regular programme which will include some issue based work. They will also work to help with personal and social development. They will bring in different agencies such as Connexions who can offer careers advice and mentoring. Youth Inclusion Programme (YIP) will also be working in a separate session with the young people who have or are experiencing some difficulties and have been referred to YIP, schools, Connexions etc. They also offer mentoring and workshops.

Community Development

- 34) Officers continue to work closely with the other partners involved in the project including PCT, Social Services etc. They also continue to work very closely with the Design and Development Group for Chaul End to ensure the continued involvement of the local community and the customers and friends of Downlands Day Centre.

Youth Service

Council Structure

- 35) The Youth Service in April 2005 will come under School Access which will be part of the new division of Children And Learning. This location recognizes that the significant role the Youth Service has to play in ensuring that Young People receive educational outcomes from their involvement with youth services that are provided and enabled through partnerships.

Youth Service West Area

- 36) The council officer who has a senior youth service responsibility for area West is now Susan Rivett who started 14th March. To support Susan is Sita Hall who is new to the post of area worker in training. Any youth officer can be contacted on 484239 or at youthservice@luton.gov.uk.

International Womens Week

- 37) On March 8th 2005 Lea Manor will host the event to raise awareness around a variety of issues affecting young women. The evening will consist of topical workshops – to include eating disorders and relationships, Sexual health related issues, History of Women's Vote & Have Your Say, Teenage Pregnancy, Glass painting, Jewellery making, Connexions Advice / Information , Dance, Henna Hand Painting and hair braiding.
- 38) This town wide event is open to young people between 11 – 21 years, and transport was available to ensure young people from other areas of town could access the event.

Leagrave Area - Hockwell Ring Youth Club

- 39) The club is open on both a Thursday and Friday evening at the community centre. The program of activities based during these sessions have been recently around the issues of sexual health, drug awareness, sports and facilitated discussions on topical events.

Lewsey Area - Lewsey Youth Club

- 40) This busy club is open on both Monday and Wednesday evenings. The program of activities in addition to the usual drop in activities have consisted of quizzes and planned discussions on issues such as alcohol, drugs, Homelessness, earthquakes, famine and floods.

Lewsey Area - Halyard Youth Center

- 41) This is one of five of the large youth centers which are available for young people across Luton. The center is a standalone building on Halyard High School site. A comprehensive program of social and personal educational activities is provided in addition to all the sporting and recreational activities. Issues covered have included bullying, sex drugs, alcohol, smoking, personal hygiene, legal rights, healthy eating, media discussions.

Challney Area – Chaul End Youth Project

- 42) The Chaul End Youth project has now successfully reopened. The club was reopened on the 21st February on a Monday evening. Before this took place staff worked with young people in the area who provide feedback on areas of needs and wants. This included drug and sexual information, trips, to be able to have somewhere to socialise, football, sports, to be able to have discussions on things that affect them.

Detached Youth Work

- 43) The local authority detached youth workers have been working on a pilot mobile bus project with Safer Luton Partnership and Lubyas. The project has been working in the five area committees of Luton at varying times. The project has successfully engaged with a number of young people on the streets of Luton. Other organizations have also attended the bus and provided front line services to young people. A detached youth workers forum has now been established in to support the many different youth workers who are employed in different agencies to work with young people on the streets of Luton.
